#### Count on Yourself

The school year is underway and this is an important time to review your procedures and ensure that you can count on yourself! Unfortunately, tight budgets are taking their toll on communication and public relation positions in school districts across the state. While being concerned about your job security is natural, there are more productive ways to protect your position. In a school district stacked with data and records, how can you demonstrate that your work counts?

Count on yourself. Literally. Throughout the school year, find a way to keep tabs on the important work you do communicating with your community. There are many days in a PR office where you find yourself saying, "What exactly did I do today?" If you were constantly on the phone or responding to emails, the whole day can slip away with nothing concrete to show for it.... Unless you find a way to quantify this subjective work into a record you can count on.

It's often as simple as a phone log or a weekly review of your e-mail and calendar. Set an appointment with yourself every week, just ten minutes, to review your work and progress and tally what you have accomplished. Pay particular attention to anything you do that prevents a bubbling issue from exploding into an incident. Again, this is a subjective area, because it is hard to say what issues might explode, but if you can't remember the number of minor issues you handled, will anyone else?

With this information at your fingertips, you are always prepared to demonstrate to the board or administration exactly what you have accomplished and why they still need to count on you!

What is Your Community Thinking About the Common Core?

In the last issue of e-Comm, we shared polling data on the Common Core. Despite the wide adoption of the common core standards, nearly two-thirds of those polled, or 62 percent, said they had never heard of the common core standards. Of the 38 percent who said they had heard of them, many thought – incorrectly – that the federal government was forcing states to adopt them and that the common core

covered every academic subject. Only 41 percent of those surveyed said they thought the common core would make American schools more competitive globally – a key goal of the initiative.

Do you know what your community thinks about the common core? If not, it may be a good time to perform a quick poll and gather their feedback. There are many easy survey resources like survey monkey or quia to help you. Without surveying your community, it is quite difficult to measure their knowledge, concern and/or interest in the implementation of the Common Core. You can be sure you are communicating the necessary information about Common Core if you do a quick poll first. As your district moves forward with curriculum changes and assessment changes related to the Common Core, it is important to know the community understands why you are changing and what it means to them.
